On Clipped Wings by Jameela Alter

This is the selection for Duncan's January Book Club, at which the author, Jameela Alter, was present. Do yourself a favor; read this book. The Friends purchased a copy for the Duncan collection, and it will be available for checkout. Two passages really stayed with me:

Pp. 281-282—A prayer created by Scott and Komali in anticipation of becoming new parents provides an interesting presentation and questioning of various religious beliefs and traditions. I found it very moving and would suggest it be read by everyone.

P. 294—Komali's response to Tusneem following her harsh comment on Komali's giving 500 rupees to a beggar woman: "...good memories make people do good things. Who knows what she will do for someone some day, now that she can believe in little miracles."

Seward—Lincoln's Indispensable Man by Walter Stahr

Make no mistake, he was just that. Lincoln confided in Seward on all matters in his administration, and Seward provided input on seemingly every major decision that Lincoln made. This book is particularly timely, given the release of the movie *Lincoln*, which tells the story of the passage of the 13th amendment, outlawing slavery. *Seward* provides more nuance around some of the more disturbing aspects, from a political ethics perspective. This is a good read; very enjoyable and entertaining.

Zoobiquity: What Animals Can Teach Us About Health and the Science of Healing by Barbara Natterson-Horowitz

Although co-written by a cardiologist, this book, full of fascinating case studies, addresses the intersection between human and non-human medicine for the "non" doctor readers among us. Dr. Natterson-Horowitz deftly describes how much humans are a part of the animal kingdom as she illustrates how human medicine would be better if veterinarians were part of the equation. It's a novel perspective on understanding human disease and health by looking at similarities and differences found in animals, from family pets to those only found in the wild. I can't think of anyone who wouldn't benefit from reading this book, and it should be required reading in every medical school.

Capital: A Novel by John Lanchester

Engagingly written, this sweeping social novel captures many of the obsessions of our time just as the recent financial meltdown is beginning. Set in the Britain of today, this 577 page book develops 10 very separate plot lines affecting 20 different characters, all of whom have only one thing in common: the South London street on which they live or make their living. Divided into short, very readable chapters, this novel is recommended for anyone who loves a good read and has sufficient time in his or her daily lives just for that purpose.

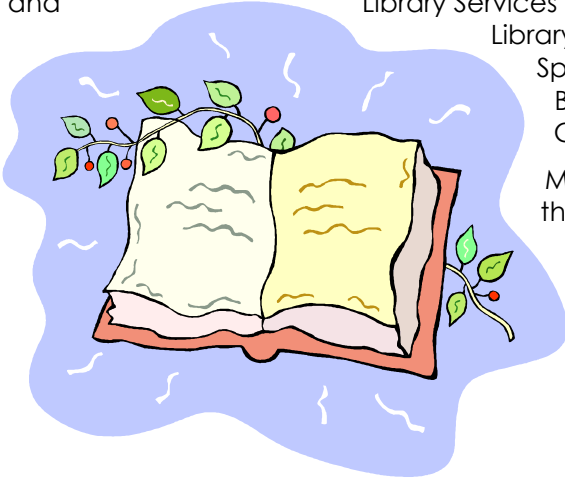
Welcome Stephanie Clark

News for the Children

I would really like to express my heartfelt appreciation to the Duncan Friends for all the support and friendship they have given me over my time here and that they have given to the Children's Department. The Friends have been very generous to Children's in terms of financial support. The programs we offer as part of the summer reading program are funded by the Friends. We use puppets in our preschool programs and these were purchased by the Friends (the puppets are a huge hit with the kids and the adults alike). The decorations that you see scattered around the library, for the most part, came from the Friends; we do try to change them seasonally and we reuse them for several years.



Another big area of support is craft supplies which we have a lot of fun using with the older kids. I have been told that the crafts we do are "more fun" than crafts that are frequently done in either preschool or elementary school. In fact, we just purchased a lot of cool new craft items that I will never get to use. Boo-hoo! The turkeys that the elementary students made pre-Thanksgiving were a bigger hit than we ever anticipated and many parents who saw our samples on display asked for directions so that their kids could make them at home. Two families asked for something of similar appeal for the winter holidays when it was too late to keep up turkeys; we were told that we had dressed up their homes. We are afraid that we have now set up

extremely high expectations. The great part of these programs is just talking with the kids as they make their crafts; we get to know the kids and they get to know us. The crafts that I do for the 3-5 year olds in the weekly storytimes keep the refrigerators in those homes well-decorated and usually generate conversations about what we did in the programs.

I am positive that there are many other ways in which the Friends support the Children's Department even if I can't remember them all now or want to delineate them all. What I can say is that, without the Friends' support, Duncan Children's Department would not be what it is today, a lively and bustling department. Thank you very much.

I can't believe that I am leaving my Duncan family. Actually I am only leaving my workplace but I will still be a part of the Duncan community and library family. Film Program Concludes Its First Year and Moves to a Second Year with New Series and a Cinema Club

In June of 2012 the Friends launched a monthly series of classic movies in the film noir genre ("Noir at Duncan") which is free and open to the public. The Friends' Board also purchased a motorized dropdown screen and a ceiling mounted sound system for the library to complement the state-of-the-art DVD projector that the City library administration had provided. These improvements have substantially enhanced the viewing experience of movie fans.

Each screening in the series is accompanied by a 10-15 minute introduction of the movie and a post-screening discussion hosted by St. Elmo's Coffee Pub. Response to the series has been enthusiastic with attendance ranging from more than 30 to slightly less than 20. The Noir at Duncan series continues on the first Wednesday of the month at 6:45 PM through June 2013. Films remaining in the series are *In a Lonely Place*, *The Big Heat*, *Kiss Me Deadly*, and *Touch of Evil*. June's screening will be a "mystery movie" (title withheld) to conclude the noir series. A new series featuring four or five movies directed by Alfred Hitchcock is scheduled to launch in July.

Starting in February, the Friends will launch another series, "Saturday Matinees at Duncan." This series will feature a variety of films from westerns to slapstick comedies, romantic comedies to classic drama, and sci fi to war movies. The first presentation on February 9 will recreate the Saturday afternoon matinee experience of the forties and fifties with a double-feature consisting of a Tarzan movie and an Abbott and Costello movie, as well as a Three Stooges "one reeler" and a classic cartoon.

Finally, Friends will have the opportunity to participate in the new Duncan Cinema Club. Friends who sign up for club membership will receive advance information of upcoming films, links to articles and critics' reviews and other news and information of interest to movie buffs. Friends Launch New Discussion Group dedicated to Poets and Poetry

At the first meeting, the sonnet will be focus of attention. Attendees can share their own favorite sonnets with others and discuss why the sonnet is such an enduring poetic form. Special attention will be given to the sonnets of Shakespeare.

Meetings are scheduled for the second Monday of alternating months. In April, the Poets of the Beat Generation will be the primary topic of discussion. Each session will not only focus on a particular poet or school of poets and readings from their works, but will also provide time for members to share some of their own poems with the others. In addition, guest poets in the area will be invited to read from their works. Assisting in moderating these sessions along with me will be my friend and neighbor, the Reverend David Glade and my new friend, and local Alexandria poet, Margaret Ingraham.
